
Between Tradition and Innovation: Art d'Histoire's Mission in the Digital Landscape

Have you found yourself in this situation?


Our teachers, publishing houses and blogs recommend fascinating, yet overwhelming, reading material, and we fall further and further behind.


The tempting shortcut to getting back on track is to watch blogs and popular videos.

Who hasn't taken a shortcut by reading a well-written IA summary instead of the original text?


We believe it is possible to satisfy the need for rapid access to information while maintaining the high academic standards specific to research.

MISSION


To transform traditional formats, such as long reading lists of pdf, into modern, concise formats that align with academic learning and contemporary browsing habits.



CURRENT EDUCATIONAL CHALLENGES AND OUR RESPONSE



CHALLENGES

Teaching art history presents at least two challenges.

The first is the vast quantity of available texts and images. In a field in which billions of lines of text are being digitised and millions of blogs are commenting on thousands of works of art, the amount of information is overwhelming. All is exacerbating this critical situation exponentially.

The second challenge is that of ultra-performance. By comparison, the apprentice or experienced art historian seems anachronistic, progressing slowly from one article to another in a vast, dusty library. Yet their research remains indispensable as they delve into infallible sources.

How can we quickly access scientific information lost among billions of digitised lines? How can we encourage students to adopt a scientific research approach while still allowing them to browse with just three clicks?



ENGAGING ACADEMIC CONTENT

Yes, it's an annotated anthology, but we must ensure that readers are not put off by too much text.

This famous F-shaped reading pattern could destroy all educational efforts. the tragedy of digitised text, consists of scanning a text with the eyes. Unless you have a photographic memory, you will only really read the first line and half of the second line, before reading more vertically. Almost all of the in-depth information is lost.

This is why our fact sheets are limited to one or two pages, with spacious areas of images. The advantage of this short multimedia format is solid but light text and dynamic graphics.



LISA: AN INTERACTIVE ANTHOLOGY

LISA is an interactive, video-based educational tool which combines engaging content with scientifically reliable primary sources.

Thanks to a system of clickable pop-ups, similar to footnotes in a scientific text and embedded at an average rate of once per minute in each video, users can access detailed information sheets. These files cite irrefutable academic sources, which can be viewed in their original digitised format with a single click.

The aim is to simplify the learning process by providing students, teachers and professionals with easy access to historical documents, thereby making the subject matter more engaging.

SCIENTIFIC APPROACH

At Art d'Histoire, academic rigour lies at the heart of our research approach. Our work is based on the highest standards of verification and authenticity.

We prioritise primary sources such as contemporary documents, including newspapers, letters and official archives, to ensure that all published information is accurate and unaltered. Spelling mistakes will be marked with [sic], unless the editor has already corrected them.

We have developed a strict anti-error policy aimed at eliminating any biased or erroneous sources. Our teams are dedicated to meticulously searching for authentic sources to ensure the longevity of our content. This preserves historical integrity and provides students, researchers, and enthusiasts with access to a reliable, sustainable database of transparent documents.

Additionally, our sustainability policy aims to prevent '404 errors' and 'content no longer online' messages. As it is not the responsibility of a museum to ensure stable links, we limit the number of links to websites belonging to museums, authors' societies, and so on.




